## MiniSurvey Series – Housing & Permitting Fees

The Center for Municipal Research & Innovation conducted a survey of the 412 municipalities in Florida regarding their housing and permitting fees and policies. The survey was conducted electronically from January 30 – February 15, 2019 with a response rate of 42% or 173 cities.

## **Key Take-Aways**

Of municipalities who responded:

- 90% of cities do not currently charge a mobility fee.
  - Of cities that do charge a mobility fee, 67% assess the fee for affordable housing.
  - Nearly ¼ of cities assess impact fees for affordable housing.
- More than half of cities (58%) have an in-house building department.
  - The median number of state-certified plans examiners in each city is one.
  - Building code inspection fees are posted on the websites of 55% of cities.
- Permit fees have remained the same for 67% of cities since 2016 relating to the enforcement on the Florida Building Code.
  - Only ¼ of cities have had to increase their permitting fees.
- 85% of cities have not refunded permit fees due to fewer services to a property per Florida Statute 553.80.
  - Nearly 40% of those cities state that their city provides the same level of service to all properties for permit value amount, so no refund is needed.
  - Other cities that have not provided refunds indicate that the fees are set and collected by their county building department/inspector.
